Spiritual Care aids in Passover observance

Spiritual Care will distribute boxes of matzah for those who observe the Jewish holiday of Passover (Pesach) through Sunday, April 20. Boxes are available in the Spiritual Care Office and can also be distributed in inpatient unit break rooms with notes of support.

Passover is an eight-day celebration marking the Israelites' deliverance from captivity in Egypt under the rule of Pharoah. During this time, our observant Jewish friends remove chametz (leavened foods products along with kitchen utensils and tableware that are replaced with special Passover dishes and cooking tools) from their homes as part of the work of preparing for the Seder evenings that include a retelling of this story of liberation. In the place of leavened bread, they eat matzo, an unleavened bread that symbolically captures the haste with which Israelites had to leave Egypt. There simply wasn't time for the bread to rise on their way to freedom.

Katie Mapula recognized for outstanding leadership, innovation



Katie Mapula, MSN, RN, Director of Nursing for the Critical Care and Burn Center at Parkland, has been named the 2025 recipient of the prestigious Pamela Austin Thompson Emerging Leader Award by the American Organization for Nursing Leadership (AONL). This award honors a rising star in healthcare leadership who has demonstrated significant potential, leadership excellence as well as a commitment to advancing the nursing profession.

The Pamela Austin Thompson Emerging Leader Award is named in honor of AONL Chief Executive Officer Emeritus, Pamela Austin Thompson, whose leadership and advocacy efforts helped shaped the future of nursing leadership programs. The award recognizes a nurse leader with less than five years of formal leadership experience who has

shown exemplary leadership within their organization, community and the nursing field at large.

During the pandemic, Katie was instrumental in creating a life-support therapy intensive care unit (ICU) at Parkland Memorial Hospital, ensuring that patients received the critical care they needed. She also led the establishment of a new cardiovascular ICU, strengthening the hospital's capacity to provide comprehensive care to patients with complex heart conditions. In addition, Katie's innovative approach to patient care led to a streamlined process for transferring burn patients from the emergency department to the Burn Unit. This initiative significantly reduced emergency department wait times and allowed for the rapid delivery of specialized wound care, improving patient outcomes.

"It is an honor to receive the Pamela Austin Thompson Emerging Leader Award, and I'm grateful to work with such dedicated professionals at Parkland," Katie said. "This recognition is a testament to the collaborative spirit and commitment to excellence that defines our team."

"Katie has demonstrated outstanding leadership throughout her career at Parkland," said Donna Richardson, DNP, RN, NEA-BC, Executive Vice President and Chief Nursing Executive at Parkland. "Her ability to innovate, lead with compassion and drive positive change has had a profound impact on our patients and staff.
