From the roof of Parkland to the roof of Africa


Nicole Moler, Advanced Practice Manager, and Jessica Baxter, Patient Safety & Clinical Risk Manager, both work here at Parkland. But they share an even more unique bond: they are both ovarian cancer survivors.

That's why this summer, Nicole, a 5-year survivor, and Jessica, a 17-year survivor, joined the National Ovarian Cancer Coalition (NOCC)'s mission to bring "hope to new heights." As a part of this effort, they volunteered to climb Mount Kilimanjaro in Tanzania. Kilimanjaro, also known as the Roof of Africa, measures 19,341 feet in elevation and is the highest single free-standing mountain above sea level globally.

The two Parkland team members joined 13 other ovarian cancer survivors, caregivers, and family members dedicated to conquering the disease that accounts for more deaths than



any other gynecologic cancer. The challenge of climbing Kilimanjaro, while not a technical climb, is known to be an extreme altitude mountain trek, with less than 50% of those attempting to reach the summit doing so. Their team of trekkers took seven days to complete their journey. And

To date, this team of 15 has proudly raised \$291,000 to help support NOCC's mission "to save lives through the prevention and cure of ovarian cancer and to improve the quality of life for survivors and caregivers."

With the current risk of a woman getting ovarian cancer during her lifetime at about 1 in 78, there is no reliable diagnostic test or screening, and it is critical to continue to educate everyone on the signs and symptoms of the 5th deadliest cancer. Nicole and Jessica are committed to sharing their knowledge on the signs and symptoms of ovarian cancer and continuing to support the survivors and their caregivers in the hope that their efforts help even one woman avoid what they survived. They are a great example of Parkland team members who make a difference both within the health system and beyond.




▼Lasting Impressions: Armando Quiroz

Schwartz Rounds is a time set aside where members of the organization meet and share experiences contributing to their self-care. It was best said by one participant: "Schwartz Rounds are a place where people who don't usually talk about the heart of the work are willing to share their vulnerability, to question themselves. The program provides an opportunity for dialogue that doesn't happen anywhere else in the hospital."

► Guidelines for using personal space heaters With temperatures getting colder, there has been an increase in the number of non-compliant personal space heaters

With temperatures getting colder, there has been an increase in the number of non-compliant personal space heaters identified in Parkland buildings. In addition, the large draw of power from space heaters can cause breakers to trip, shutting off computers and other office equipment. To keep patients, visitors and employees safe, space heaters are restricted from all sleeping spaces unless medically required.

Dress in layers to help keep yourself warm. If everyone in your area is cold, submit an engineering corrective work order by calling ext. 71000. There is only one type of space heater that is allowed. All space heaters must meet the following criteria:

- · Must be UL listed with a legible tag attached
- Must be convection type
- Heating elements cannot glow or exceed 212 degrees Fahrenheit
- Must be clean and in good mechanical condition
- Must have overheating protection
- Must have tip-over protection
